STEP 1: LET'S GO BIRDWATCHING!

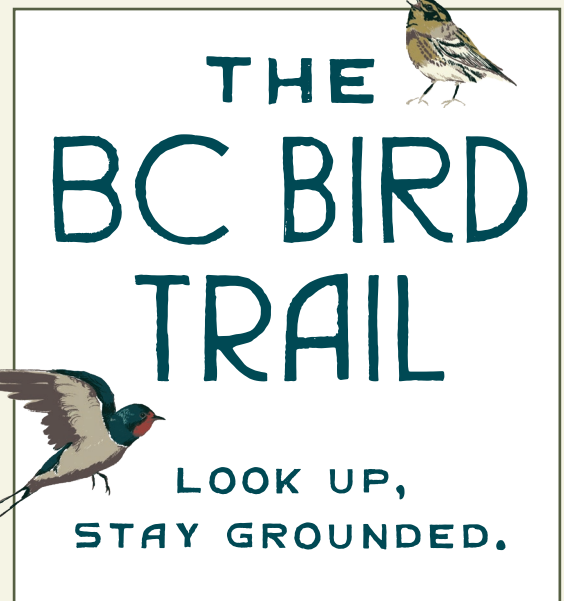
It's time to choose a location to experience on your birdwatching adventure.

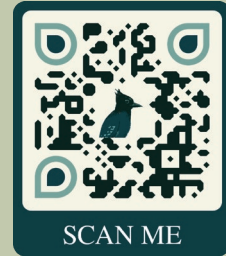
Not sure what a Black-Capped Chickadee looks like? No problem! Just scan the QR code at the bottom of the page for pictures of the species and more birding info.
